






Culturally Responsive Curriculum Development Institute

Launched in 2021, the <u>AZ HSI Consortium</u> seeks to strengthen the individual and collective capacity of Arizona HSIs to intentionally support conditions necessary for Latinx student success in Arizona. The AZ HSI Consortium aims to bring together all HSIs throughout Arizona to develop a community of practice and engage collectively in professional development, support the exchange of evidence-based and culturally relevant practices, facilitate successful transfer of Latinx students to Arizona universities, and collaborate across HSIs

AZ HSI Summit

The 2nd Annual <u>AZ HSI Summit</u> took place on September 11, 2023 at the University of Arizona. This was a one-day, in-person conference for faculty, staff, administrators, students, and community partners aimed at:


Capacity Building Through HSI Grants and Research Development

Receiving HSI designation from the U.S. Department of Education does not provide additional secured funding. Instead, institutions who apply annually and are granted HSI status are eligible to compete for funding opportunities available to HSIs and Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs).

These data represent the number of proposals submitted in calendar year 2023 at the UArizona that advance our commitment to grants and research development as an HSI. Proposers may be responding to funding opportunities that are 1) for HSIs only; 2) for Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) only; or 3) any funding opportunity that intentionally involves minority students and/or communities/populations.

In January 2022, UArizona implemented a tracking mechanism through UAccess Research to track HSI related proposal activity.







HSI Grants Development Institute

In November 2023, HSI Initiatives held its 3rd annual HSI Grants Development Institute at The University of Arizona. The purpose of this full-day institute was to: generate awareness of Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) related funding opportunities; strengthen understanding of HSI models and frameworks; and cultivate potential networks among those with shared equity-focused interests for pursuing HSI funding opportunities.

Project ADELANTE: Advancing Culturally-Responsive Place-Based Educational Opportunities for Latinx Students in the Borderlands

Project ADELANTE: Advancing Culturally Responsive Place-Based Educational Opportunities for Latinx Students in the Borderlands includes three components – an internship and career readiness program to connect undergraduates with community businesses and nonprofits, professional development fellowships for UArizona faculty and staff, and a first-year writing program curriculum based on the Latin American "testimonio" tradition of personal narratives.

<u>Connect Arizona Now: Digital Inclusion for Underserved Students and Communities of Southern Arizona</u>

Connect Arizona Now project will help close the digital divide among diverse, rural, underserved communities in Southern Arizona that lack reliable, high-speed broadband access. The project activities include creating "equipment bundles" (including hotspots, laptops, headphones, and webcams) that can be checked out by students, expanding University of Arizona network and classroom technologies, providing support personnel at education sites in rural communities, and more.

<u>HSI Hubs: Leveraging Insights to Strengthen Regional Talent and Opportunities (LISTO)</u>

Project LISTO will support a growing community of HSIs and its stakeholders by (1) scaling existing capacity-building practices to increase reach and impact, (2) documenting the design of a statewide HSI consortium, and providing a blueprint to inform community and capacity-building strategies in other states, and (3) generating new knowledge on the impact of this statewide consortium on broadening participation in STEM and associated leading factors.

HSI HUD Center: Arizona Research Center for Housing Equity & Sustainability (ARCHES)

The HSI HUD Center will establish the Arizona Research Center for Housing Equity and Sustainability, or ARCHES. The new center will be a partnership among 19 researchers at Arizona State University, UArizona, Northern Arizona University and the University of New Mexico. The new center's research on housing security will inform equitable housing growth and production to support Hispanic and underserved households.

Nourish (Nutrition Opportunities for Undergraduate Students Promoting Resilient And Inclusive Sustainable Food And Health Systems)

The NOURISH Scholars Program is an innovative educational model to increase access to graduate and professional school preparation and mentoring for undergraduate students historically underrepresented areas of food, agriculture, natural resources and human sciences. The ultimate goal of this program is to build the pipeline of diverse STEM and health professionals.

<u>LIDERES Institute: Leaders in Designing Equitable Research</u> <u>Engagement through Servingness</u>

The purpose of LIDERES Institute is to bring together community members, future researchers, and current scientist/subject matter experts to create a training blueprint targeting research teams who would like to pursue patient - centered outcomes research/comparative effectiveness research to enhance health services for individuals experiencing communication disability from Hispanic and Latinx communities

UArizona was the first four-year public university in the state of Arizona to become an HSI and one of 21 R1 HSIs across the nation.
