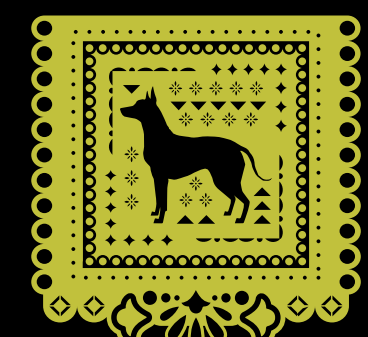
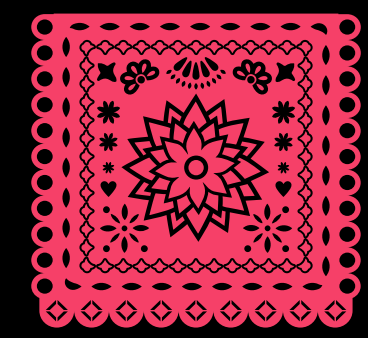

VOLUNTEERISM IN THE UNITED STATES

PERCENTAGE RATE:

- Whites continued to volunteer at a higher rate (26.4 percent) than Blacks (19.3 percent), Asians (17.9 percent), and **Hispanics (15.5 percent)**.

MAIN TYPES OF ACTIVITIES VOLUNTEERS PERFORMED ALSO VARIED BY EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT:

- Bachelor's degree and higher were more likely to provide professional or management assistance or to tutor or teach than volunteers with less education.
- Volunteers with less than a bachelor's degree were more likely to collect, prepare, distribute, or serve food or engage in general labor than those with at least a bachelor's degree.

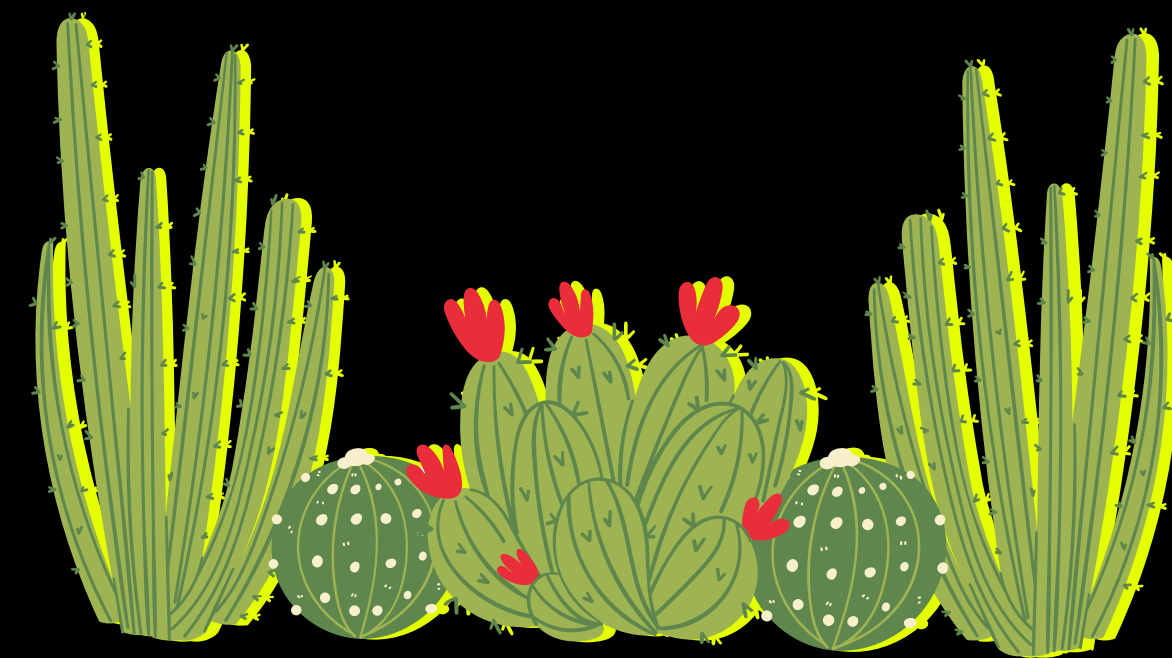
CHALLENGES FOR VOLUNTEERISM

- Limitations in social capital,
 - Identity, reciprocity, shared information, collective action.
- First immigrant generation challenges.
 - Financial, language, access, time.



TIPS TO NORMALIZE COMMUNITY SERVICE

- Building strong partnerships between academic institutions.
- Trust and respect.
- Engage hispanic figures of influence within the community, school, parents, and children.
- Encourage bilingualism.
- Provide resources.

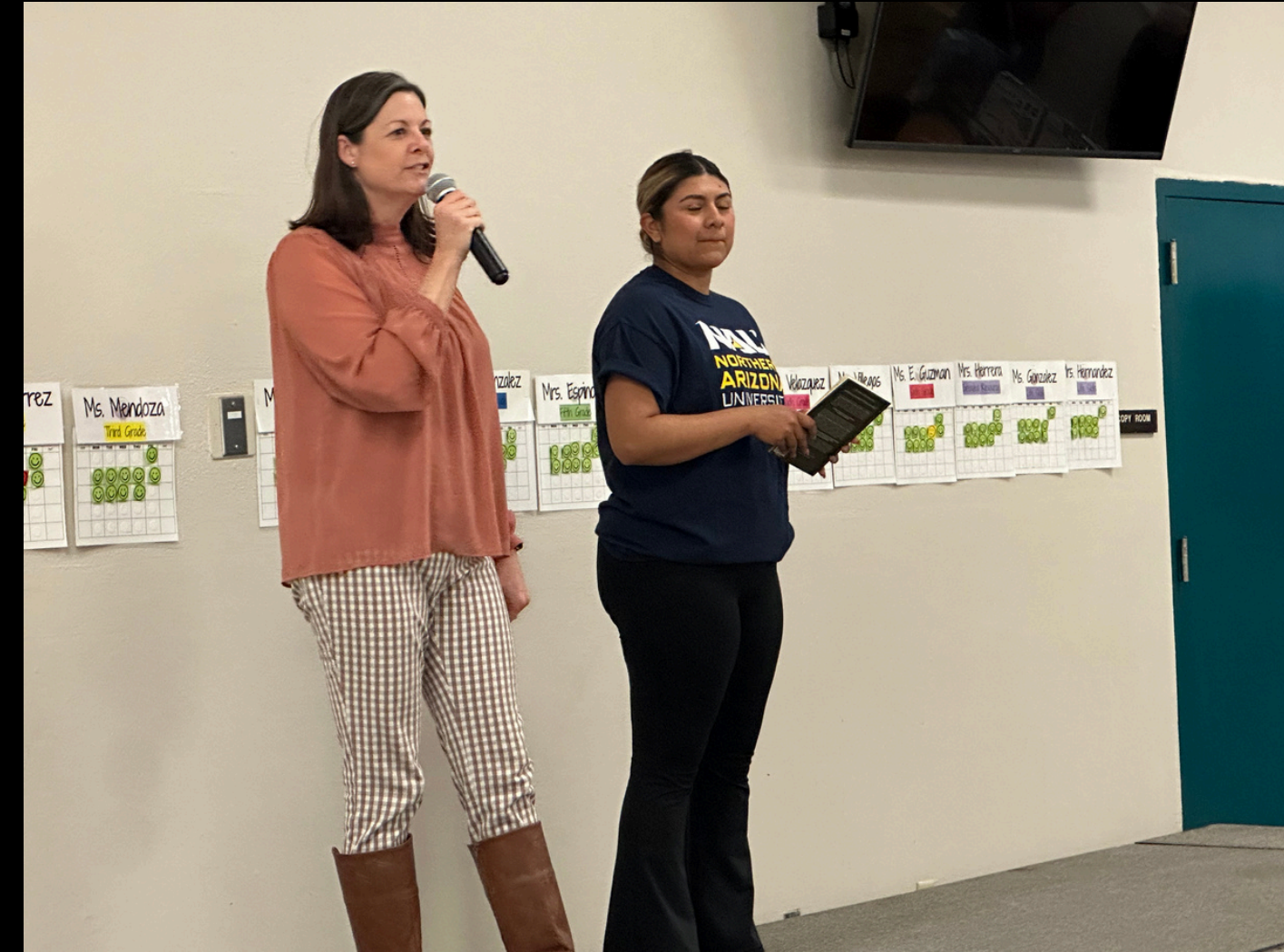
