Launched in 2021, the <u>AZ HSI Consortium</u> seeks to strengthen the individual and collective capacity of Arizona HSIs to intentionally support conditions necessary for Latinx student success in Arizona. The AZ HSI Consortium aims to bring together all HSIs throughout Arizona to develop a community of practice and engage collectively in professional development, support the exchange of evidence-based practices, facilitate the successful transfer of students to Arizona universities, and collaborate across HSIs when seeking funding opportunities and other important partnerships.

HSI Grants Development Institute

On November 22, 2024, HSII held its 4th annual HSI Grants Development Institute, hosted by HSI partner, Pima Community College. The purpose of this full-day institute is to: 1) generate awareness of HSI related funding opportunities; 2) strengthen understanding of HSI models and frameworks; and 3) cultivate networks among those with shared interests for pursuing HSI funding opportunities. This year was the first time that participants from HSIs outside of AZ were able to attend. Demand was high, with a waitlist of up to 50 people. This work was supported by the National Science Foundation, awards #2336054 & #2311013.

Graduate Communities for Academic Fellowship & Efficacy (Grad CAFE): A Holistic Multi-tiered Mentoring Model

This project seeks to increase the success of graduate students from diverse backgrounds in STEM through the creation, expansion, and assessment of the Graduate Communities for Academic Fellowship and Efficacy (Grad CAFE) program. Grad CAFE is a strengths-based, holistic, intersectional, interdisciplinary multi-tiered mentoring community that has the potential to transform how underrepresented graduate scholars in STEM are supported by directly addressing three key issues: 1) decreased mental health and well-being among graduate students, 2) the local and national lack of diversity in STEM programs, and 3) gaps in retention and completion for underrepresented graduate students.

Pathways Into Veterinary Medicine: A Community College Entry To Success Scholars (Access) Program

The ACCESS program will engage students enrolled in community colleges across the state of Arizona to support their successful entry into the veterinary degree program at UArizona. Ranked 5th in demand for veterinarians in the country, Arizona is experiencing a decline of large animal veterinarians and an increase in pet ownership. The UA-CVM is committed to ensuring access to all, especially to those from those areas in Arizona that are underserved for veterinary health care.

2024 GRANT SPOTLIGHT: AWARDED HSI RELATED PROJECTS

Linking Student Assets to Student Success: Pathways to an Engineering Workforce for the Southwest

The overall goal of this project is to increase STEM degree completion of low-income, high-achieving undergraduates with demonstrated financial need. The primary objectives are (1) to improve persistence, retention, and graduation rates and placements in engineering among eligible students from rural and urban campuses using intentional asset-based practices, and (2) to investigate differences in assets, outcomes, engineering identities, and placements between students at a rural campus and those at an urban campus.

ENGAGED in Agricultural Systems and Technology

ENGAGED in Agriculture Systems and Technology (ENGAGED in AST) is an integrated project that provides educational opportunities and research experiences for undergraduate students, particularly those who are underrepresented in engineering, to: develop an understanding of the challenges surrounding agriculture and food production, explore national and worldwide food insecurity issues, experience the research process and create effective technology solutions that enable farmers, ranchers and others to address critical challenges related to agriculture and food production. The goal of ENGAGED in AST is to support underrepresented students' persistence toward engineering degree completion, pursue a career or graduate studies in agriculture systems and technology or a related field and become change agents in their communities.
