




CIELO provides high-impact experiential learning opportunities that integrate travel, global education, service learning, cultural exchange, and community-engaged leadership across local, statewide, and international settings to empower students with knowledge and skill sets to utilize as they continue their careers at UA and beyond.



The program has continued to build partnerships across campus and with other HSI institutions, helping it expand its capacity to serve students and bring this innovative learning experience to other institutions. CIELO partnerships have included UA Athletics, Arizona Online, the Agnese Nelms Haury Program, and the W.A. Franke Honors College, among others. Through partnerships, CIELO provided funding for students, offered academic credit, and established new innovative programs. CIELO was also recognized as a micro-credential program offering the Global Experiential Learning & Engagement digital badge for participants.

Capacity Building Through HSI Grants and Research Development

Receiving HSI designation from the U.S. Department of Education does not provide additional funding. Instead, institutions are eligible to compete for funding opportunities available to HSIs.

HSI Initiative's grants development team works to identify, track, and evaluate HSI related funding opportunities and connect them with PIs and teams throughout campus.

Work in this area aligns with all three Strategic Imperatives. The majority of our grant support centers student success; we work closely with faculty and staff to develop research proposals; and have strong and reciprocal partnerships in the communities we serve.

1) for HSIs only

Fostering Undergraduate Student Persistence and Community in STEM Through the Graduate Educators IMPACT Institute

- PI Kimberly Sierra, STEM Learning Center
- Sponsor: National Science Foundation

The IMPACT Institute for Graduate Educators, is a professional development experience that prepares graduate students to teach and mentor with confidence, creativity, and compassion at the UA. Through engaged learning, community collaboration, and intentional mentorship from experienced educators, participants explore student-centered, asset-based teaching practices that recognize the unique stories and experiences students bring to their STEM classrooms.



HSI Grants & Research Development

C-STAR: Increasing Understanding of Degree Completion at the UA



In 2025, HSI Initiatives, Assessment and Research, and Societal Impacts, teamed up to design a new internal, one-year funding opportunity called “Completion Strategies Tested for Acceleration & Refinement” (C-STAR). Directly aligned with Strategic Imperative #1: Success for Every Student, the goal of C-STAR is for selected teams to use a data informed approach to identify strategies, programs and practices that positively contribute to degree completion at the UA.

2025 Funded Projects

Building a Case for Biocalculus

Project Lead: Lauren Harrison, Ecology and Evolutionary Biology
This project compares student outcomes (retention, graduation, and time-to-degree) from two Calculus I pathways to determine which path most positively impacts undergraduate student success.



Evaluation of the Efficacy of the UA VIP Program to Improve Student Retention and Graduation Rates

Project Lead: Dr. Kay Orzech, Program Coordinator for Vertically Integrated Projects

This project analyzes five years of existing quantitative and qualitative data for the Vertically Integrated Projects (VIP) program to determine the extent to which the program contributes to retention, graduation, and overall student success.

Measuring the Impact of CIELO: Assessing Culturally Responsive Global Experiential Learning as a Pathway to Degree Completion

Project Lead: Dan Xayaphanh, Director, CIELO
This project will focus on analyzing CIELO student participation data compared with institutional data to determine whether CIELO participation is associated with stronger outcomes in student persistence and graduation.



Understanding Impact of AIR Education Program Internships

Project Lead: Maria Sohn Hasman
This project compares retention and graduation rates for two Arizona Institute for Resilience (AIR) student internship experiences, the “RISE” and “Earth Grant” programs.

HSI Initiatives held its 5th annual HSI Grants Development Institute, December 5, 2025, hosted at partnering HSI, Pima Community College. The purpose of this full-day institute is to:

1. Generate awareness of HSI related funding opportunities
2. Strengthen understanding of HSI models and frameworks.
3. Cultivate networks among those with shared interests for pursuing HSI funding opportunities.

To respond to rapidly changing national priorities, this year's emphasis was to provide participants with timely, actionable insights for navigating the current national grant climate.


HSI-Honors Consortium

Every fall semester, the Consortium organizes a webinar in coordination with a volunteer steering committee member. This year, the webinar was hosted by St. Edward's University. The leader, Dr. Emma Woelk, coordinated a panel session and small group conversations, whose main topics were mentorship, student funding, study abroad, and experiential learning. More than 40 attendees and five presenters participated in this webinar. The two-hour presentation included a conversation forum and panel presentations with the participation of Honors students, faculty, and staff.
- 2. Student Participation.** This is the first year that W.A. Franke Honors participated in this conference as an effort grounded in the Consortium and leadership development. Two students, Gabi Arroyo and Andrea Hernandez, leaders of Nepantla Student Association (NSA) in the UA, represented students in various sessions, including the NCHC Student Committee, to learn and discuss topics related to students in Honors.

AZ HSI Evidence-Based Practices


